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ter Camryn, little brother Tucker, and an even younger brother Parker. She also has a Husky named Foofa.

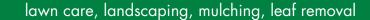

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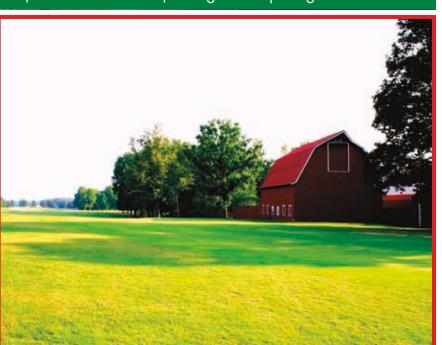

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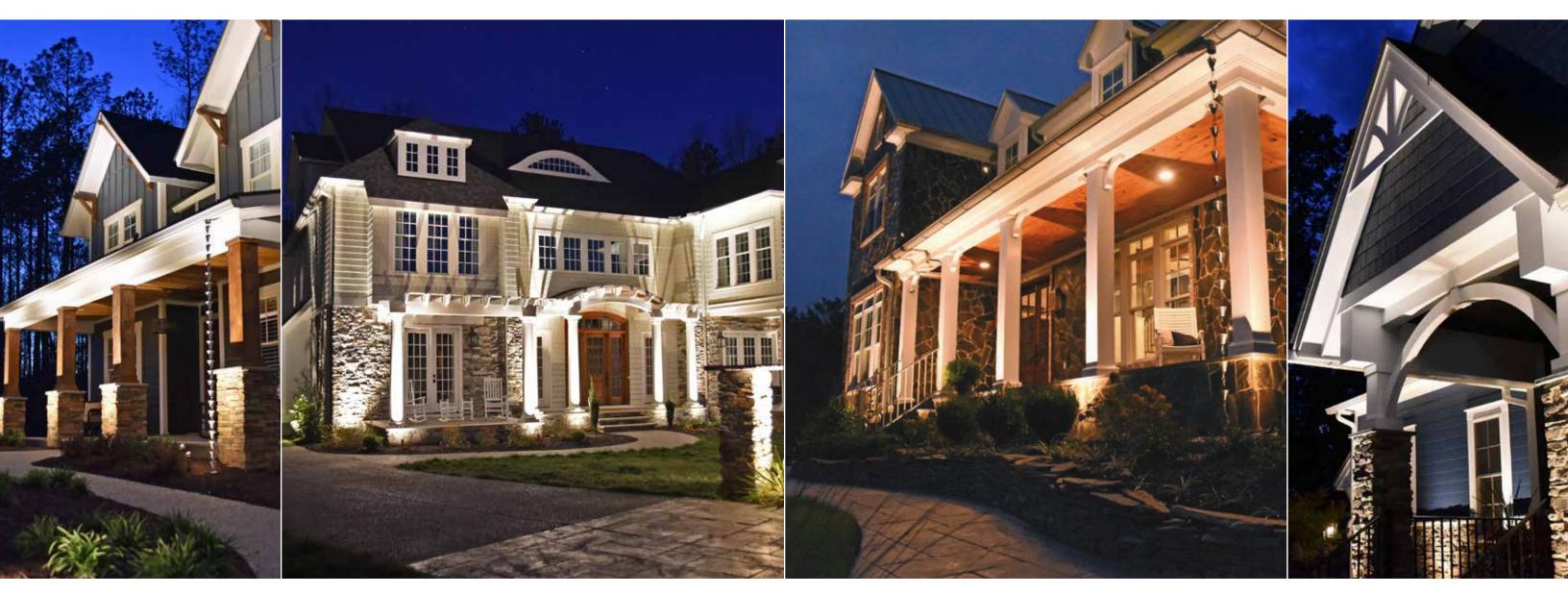

Danny **Royce:** The Road To Kona

Danny Royce is one of Hallsley's Ironmen! The Ironman is an elite triathlon event consisting of a 2.4-mile swim, 112-mile bike ride, and 26.2mile run. During Danny's ten-year involvement with this sport, he has completed around 50 total triathlons and Ironman competitions, mostly on the East Coast.

Danny swam competitively at Cornell University during college. During law school, Danny ran a little and lifted weights to stay in shape but was feeling athletically unfulfilled, especially with the loss of competitive swimming. In 2007, a friend asked Danny to join him in a sprint triathlon. Danny shares, "The first bike ride I ever went on was 11 miles, and I thought I was going to die! Needless to say, I loved the experience and became quickly invested in triathlon. My passion grew from there, and it has become a huge part of my life."

In the sport of triathlon, Danny's biggest accomplishment was qualifying for the



Ironman World Championship last September at Ironman Chattanooga. He is really excited to travel to Kona, Hawaii, this October to compete in the world championship. Maybe with some luck, Danny might show up in the background of the NBC TV footage, which typically airs in November! This dream of qualifying for the Ironman World Championship has been one Danny has been chasing for years. However, he always found himself coming up just a bit short. In some cases, it was a crushing minute or two difference for a 9-10 hour race.

Qualification for the Ironman World Championship was one of Danny's proudest athletic achievements and was more a testament to his support structure than anything he did personally. Without the support and selflessness of his amazing wife, Brittany Royce, and daughter, triathlons would not be possible. Danny shares that the true Ironman of his family is Brittany. She enables him to have these dreams and lets him chase them. Being in and training for an Ironman competition is a way of life. Danny likes finding his physical and mental limits and then breaking





those barriers. In the following interview, Danny offers Hallsley residents a glimpse into the life of an Ironman athlete.

What is a snapshot of your typical training and conditioning rou-What is the biggest challenge of being an Ironman triathlon athlete? tine for an Ironman?

In the winter, I spend a lot of time training at home. I have an awesome indoor bike setup and treadmill in my garage as well as a full-strength training equipment setup. I have the ability to do Crossfit, bike, and run all from the convenience of my house. I do most of my swimming at American Family Fitness or Swim RVA. In the summer, my training activities go outside, and I try to spend a lot of time in nature. I run and ride all over Central Virginia and try to swim in the river as much as possible. On long Saturday/Sunday rides, it's not uncommon to touch five or six counties during the course of a ride. Depending on how close (or far) I am from my target race, my weekly training is about 15-25 hours per week total, with every day having at least two or three sessions. An average training week has about 175-250 miles of biking, 40-60 miles of running, and 10-20,000 yards of swimming.

Do you normally train with a team or alone?

I do most of my training either alone or with a few local friends. Unfortunately, a lot of triathlon training involves being alone. I am





a member of the Richmond Triathlon Club, and I believe it is important to support local triathlon and local athletes. I am also part of a triathlon team called Team Every Man Jack (www.teamemj. com), based out of San Francisco. We have 75 athletes from all over the country, and there is a fairly competitive application process to join. I was really excited to be selected, and this is my first year on the team. It is pretty cool to be a part of a group of individuals who are mind-blowing athletes and, more importantly, humble, great family men, and productive members of their communities. We have doctors, lawyers, hedge fund managers, teachers, and more. A really awesome group! Our main sponsor is Every Man Jack (www.everymanjack.com), which is a high-end yet affordable men's grooming brand. They have everything a guy needs to look his best (shampoos, body washes, deodorants, sunscreen, and more), all derived from plant-based ingredients. Please feel free to use the code DRoyce18, and you can get 25% off any time through the website.

Without question, the biggest challenge is time management. Obviously, it's not easy to fit all this training, on top of family and work commitments; however, I strive to be a great husband, father, and productive lawyer for my firm. I have tried to live by the motto that it is possible to have it all if you are willing to work for it. I believe that if I put in the time and make sacrifices, it is possible to "have it all" and be the best family man, employee, and athlete that I can. There is not much room for wasted time in my schedule, and I am rarely doing one thing at a time. Multi-tasking is key! Also, cumulative fatigue can be difficult during particularly strenuous periods of training. Feeling generally exhausted all the time is not that much fun!

What special equipment do you need for a triathlon?

There is so much equipment for a triathlon! I ride a Felt IA FRD triathlon bike and use a Felt AR5 road bike on my indoor trainer. Truthfully, you can do this sport with a simple bike, a pair of run-

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ning shoes, and a pair of goggles. However, the nice equipment is the fun part! It's always easy to rationalize a shiny, new triathlon toy. It is an expensive hobby, so I try to keep it balanced in the family. If I get a new triathlon toy, I try to get my wife something nice as well ... It's only fair, right?!

Are there any apps that are helpful for training?

There are three apps that I use routinely: Training Peaks, Myfitnesspal, and Strava. Training Peaks is how my coach structures, transmits, and reviews all of my training, according to his plan. I use Myfitnesspal to track all of my nutrition macros and body weight, and I use Strava to keep up with all my other insane triathlon buddies and what they are doing in their training. I have some pretty impressive friends, and their training logs are a great reality check!

How do you push through the pain of an Ironman competition and recover from a race?

This is a tough one! In many ways, swimming prepared me to deal with immense amounts of physical pain; you get pretty good at it by staring at a black line on the bottom of a pool for two-four hours a day! In the course of an Ironman, I draw strength from my family. I think about my wife, daughter, parents, sisters, and all they sacrifice to help me. Their sacrifice and power keep me going when the pain seems more than I can bear. Admittedly, I am terrible at recovery and struggle with taper and post-race recovery. I am not happy unless I am training myself into the ground. However, Normatec recovery boots are a nice recovery tool, and I also have a portable e-stim unit for aches and pains (the code EMJ100 will get you \$100 off your own set). I often joke that I could open my own therapy office with all the tools and gadgets I have to keep myself in one piece!

Have you encountered any famous triathlon athletes along your journey?

The cool thing about triathlon is that you race right alongside the professionals, which means you get to meet them at lots of races. Most of them are really approachable and nice people! Currently, I look up to several inspirational triathlon professionals, including Lionel Sanders, Andy Potts, Jan Frodeno, and Sebastian Kienle. However, I get the most inspiration from the age group athletes that are out there becoming the best versions of themselves. The most gratifying part of any Ironman race is going to the finish line at midnight to watch the last finishers cross after 17 hours of racing. There is nothing more inspiring than those folks!

In closing, the sport of triathlon, and especially his journey to the Ironman World Championship, has taught Danny the importance of focusing on the journey and not the destination. All too often, people focus on outcomes and not processes. The most valuable lessons in life are learned from the day-to-day grind and not just on race day. No one likes to fail, but Danny believes true growth comes more from failures than successes. On the journey to be an Ironman, words of wisdom from Ovid saying, "Dripping water hollows out stone, not through force but through persistence" ring true. Becoming an Ironman is all about the journey!

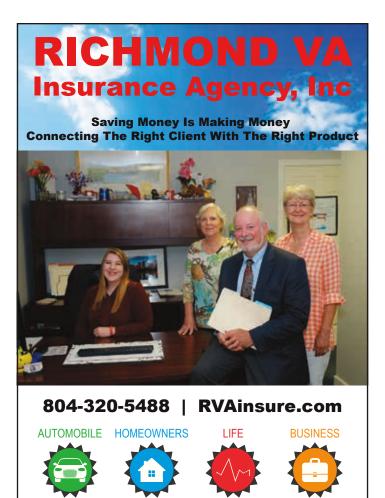
- 1. Get a box the size you want your fairy garden.

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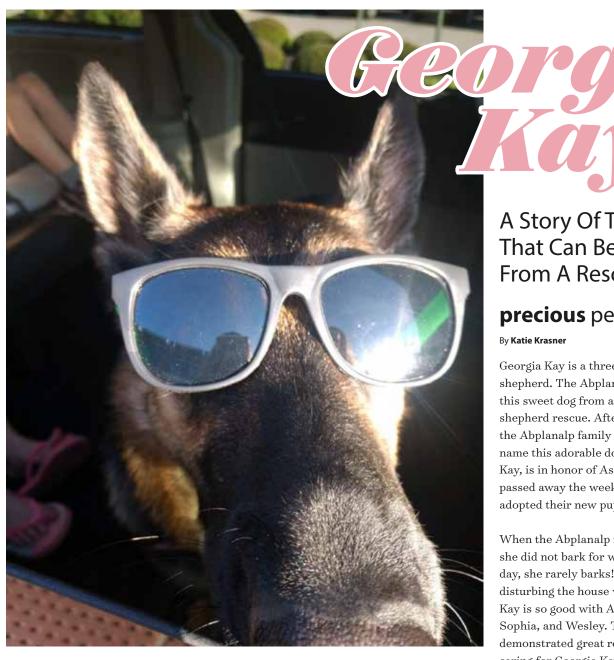




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A Story Of The Love That Can Be Found From A Rescue Pup

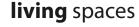

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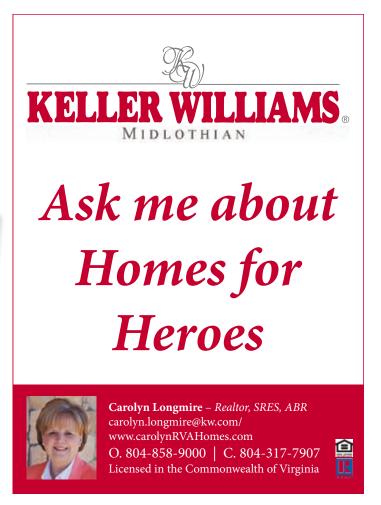

Fourth of July Mac m² Cheese

Every Fourth of July BBQ needs to have a serving of mac 'n' cheese. I have put together what I think is the perfect combo of cheeses in this recipe.

*Chef's Tip - You can put together the whole recipe the day before and keep in the fridge, baking just before you are ready to serve.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 box elbow pasta
- 3 Tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
- 4 Tbsp. flour
- 1 1/2 cups skim milk
- 2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese 8 ounces deli sliced American cheese (cut) 2 egg yolks

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Cook pasta according to box.
- 3. In 12" non-stick skillet, melt butter.
- 4. Whisk in the flour and add milk.
- 5. Bring to a boil while continuing to whisk.
- 6. Add the cheddar and American cheeses.
- 7. Whisk until cheeses are melted
- 8. Remove from heat and add egg yolks. 9. Fold in the pasta using Mix 'n' Scraper. 10. Add pasta to large stoneware serving bowl.
- 11. Sprinkle top with Parmesan cheese.
- 12. Bake 30-40 minutes.

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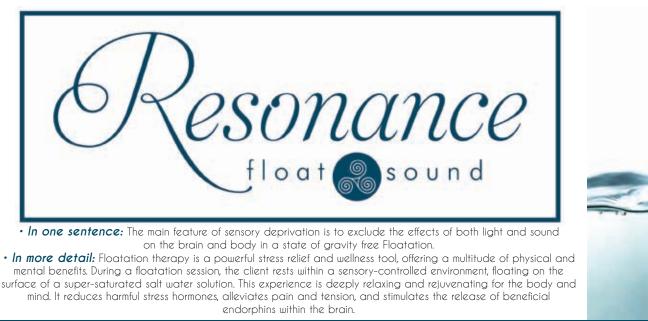

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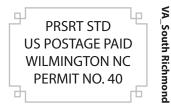
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
